About the War Memorial Organ

The organ was gifted to the school in 1923 by the Old Southendians in memory of staff and ex-pupils lost in the Great War. Installed in the Victoria Circus building, it was transferred to the Prittlewell Chase site in 1938 but blown to pieces two years later by a World War Two bomb, having to wait until 1953 before restoration by its builders, Hill Norman & Beard.



Following a fantastic and generous response to the £50K appeal to fund the professional rebuilding of the instrument in 2017/18, the organ was expanded, with new string sounds on the Swell, robust bass tones on the Pedal with both a Trombone and Acoustic Bass added, and extra versatility with a Geigen Principal and Piccolo on the Swell.

This year, the school, Old Southendian Association and Old Southendian Organ Society join together to celebrate 100 years of the organ.

About the Old Southendian Organ Society

The Old Southendian Organ Society (OSOS) was set up in 2014 to protect and enhance the future of the school's War Memorial Organ. We aim to support the organ pupils at the school by further enhancing the opportunities available to them through the friendly community of past organists of the school. Recent activities have included a number of concerts (showcasing the talents of student, staff, and past members of the school community), a workshop with the school's Organ Club and Roger Sayer in February, and free admission to this year's series of concerts celebrating the organ's centenary.



These were the principles that fuelled Cantare when it was formed in 2010 by Rachel Worth, and since then the choir has become one of the most prominent choirs for women in the Southend area under the direction of both Rachel and then Liz Elliott. The choir was delighted to welcome their new musical director, Elizabeth Dunlop, last year who has enlivened Cantare's members with her expertise and enthusiasm.



Cantare performs in a variety of venues from churches to bandstands and has taken part in local and national competitions. Highlights from these include winning first prize at both Chelmsford and Southend Music Festivals many times, most recently in 2022 where they swept the board. The choir has also won individual category awards, the Freda Parry Presentation bowl, the Musical Council Shield and the H.W.L. Hobbs Challenge Shield several times.
